FIRE CHIEF MIKE WARNER



As firefighters, we interact with our community on a daily occurrence. I was recently asked by a young child, what exactly do firefighters do? As I ponder the answer, the simple, but yet true reality is Firefighters Save Lives, Save Property, and Mitigate Hazards. What does this actually mean in our daily operations? Saving lives, means being prepared for any emergency. This includes being proficient in firefighting, advancing hose lines to extinguish the fire, searching a

dark smoky bedroom, operating technical equipment, interrupting complex cardiac rhythms, inserting an advanced airway, administrating various medications, all while performing at the peak of our trade. Saving property means acting quickly and professionally to stop the rapid growth of fire, taking memorabilia, and valuables out of harm's way, and preventing further fire spread into an area with potential to ignite. Finally, to mitigate any hazard. This could be to stop the hazard and call the power company, contact building officials of potential hazards, stop the flow of a substance heading into the Mississippi River, or isolate the hazard to prevent any further damage.

While the three terms seem basic, when you break them down, they are the furthest from it. All of our firefighters have worked tirelessly to ensure they are prepared for whatever emergency happens. This includes attending the various technical rescue classes we hosted in 2022. This also includes the daily shift training throughout the year or the weekly night training for the Paid-on-Call staff.

The downside to our profession, is sometimes no matter how skilled or prepared the firefighters are, there are contributing factors that are out of our control. With "Time" being one of the biggest.

2022 was able to produce some amazing positive outcomes. This includes the combined efforts of countless agencies, and individuals to search and rescue a family in need in the Mississippi River. The family is now able to come together and cherish the time together. Another notable incident was a fully involved structure fire. The damage was contained to the home involved and very minor damage to the close residence next door. Due to the wind conditions, the outcome could have been a lot worse. The other notable amazing outcomes were all the countless times that exceptional emergency medical aid was administered by the Paramedics. While this occurs on a daily basis, it should not be overlooked. The training that goes into becoming a certified and Licensed Emergency Medical Paramedic is priceless.





















Emergency Medical Call Types

TRAINING




The increased call volume in 2022 created training challenges for the department as on-duty crews were less-able to commit to in-depth training sessions and had to adapt to complete the necessary training. Even with these challenges firefighters completed 11,486 hours of training on various topics including firefighting, rescue, driver/operator, investigation, officer/leadership, and EMS.


A main focus in 2022 was driver/operator training. All of our staff needs to be relied upon to safely and effectively operate large and complex fire apparatus, so this is an important training. Department staff instructed a 40-hour Fire Apparatus Operator course for our career and paid-on-call firefighters. This course culminated in 25 members completing a written and practical test administered by the State Certification Board to become state certified as Fire Apparatus Operators.

Technical rescue was another area that we again spent a lot of time focusing on. The department again hosted a technical rope rescue class as well as 2 separate confined space technician classes. In partnership with the firefighter's union we were able to bring in a 40-hour confined space technician class at no cost, and send 14 members through the full week of intensive training. Being able to dedicate a week of training for these complex rescue skills greatly improves the department's ability to safely and effectively respond to technical rescue incidents within our service area. With this in mind, Red Wing Fire plans to continue being a host site for these classes for the foreseeable future.

FIRE PREVENTION



The Red Wing Fire Department's fire prevention division is based upon the importance of public relations. Our primary objectives continue to emphasize prevention of fire through fire inspections and code enforcement, plan review, public education, and fire investigation. It is through these objectives that enhanced attitudes and safer buildings are produced and maintained. Thus, the occurrence and severity of fires are greatly reduced. The fire prevention division is headed by Fire Marshal Andy Speltz. Fire Inspector Michael Babb works under the direction of the Fire Marshal and focuses on fire inspections and public education.

Fire Inspections and Code Enforcement

An important concept of fire prevention is that of conducting fire inspections of public buildings. The Fire Marshal and Fire Inspector conduct scheduled inspections in existing public and commercial buildings to ensure ongoing compliance with Minnesota State Fire Code requirements. Special inspections are also conducted upon request or upon being notified of a possible fire code violation. During fire inspections, the entire building is thoroughly inspected to evaluate code compliance. If violations are noted, a follow-up inspection is conducted to verify the violations identified have been corrected satisfactorily. The Fire Marshal also conducts fire inspections in local daycare facilities when requested by the Minnesota Department of Human Services. Inspections are conducted prior to licensing or upon special request. During 2022, there was a total of 320 fire safety inspections conducted by the division. They are as follows:


Public Education

Education continues to be an important part of the fire prevention program. However, it becomes very difficult to evaluate the effectiveness of our fire prevention programs because we do not know how many fires are actually prevented. This year, one kindergarten student and her family suffered a tragic home fire, but she was able to shout appropriate instructions to her family which allowed everyone to get out safely. We say, fire prevention education for the win. In 2022 our prevention program presented at 39 events to groups of people that ranged from pre-school children to senior citizens. They are as follows:

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)

The Red Wing Fire Department conducted 17 CPR classes in 2022. Five of those classes were taught to the BLS standard and the remaining twelve were Heart Saver First Aid courses. A total of 64 participants received their certification.



Fire Investigation

The Red Wing Fire Department is required to investigate the cause and origin of all fires. The Fire Marshal is contacted to perform the fire investigation, especially in cases of fatal fires, large loss fires, suspected arson fires, and fires involving other crimes. A total of 8 structure fires took place in 2022, all requiring a formal fire investigation. Of those 8 fires, all were accidental. Six fires were within single family homes and 2 fires were within commercial buildings. Cooking fires remain the leading cause of residential structure fires while smoking remains the leading cause of fire fatalities.
