

CITY COUNCIL LISTENING SESSIONS – AUGUST 2023

Report to the Red Wing City Council and Residents

What: The City of Red Wing held a series of six 90-minute listening sessions over four days from August 21 through August 24, 2023. A detailed list of the locations and the Council and staff participants is included at the end of this document. A note of how the sessions were publicized is also at the end of this document.

Purpose: The purpose of the listening sessions was for City Council members to hear from residents across the community about concerns, ideas, and questions, including on issues related to the Council's upcoming 2024 budget decisions.

How this information will be used: A final report will be published on the City's website and City Beat, attached to a Council budget workshop packet, and included in a Council agenda packet.

How the sessions were run: Four to seven Council members and the mayor attended each meeting. The meetings were all publicly noticed so any member could attend without concerns of a quorum. Between four and nine staff members also attended each meeting. When residents arrived, they were asked to individually write down their answers to four questions: (a) What is your favorite thing about living in Red Wing?; (b) What do you think is the most serious issue in Red Wing? (c) What topics do you want covered in this session? (d) What questions do you have for City Council members at this session? Residents wrote their answers on sticky notes and placed the notes on large sheets on the walls. The City's Community Engagement Facilitator, Michelle Leise, facilitated each session, grouping the conversation by topic based on what people had written. Residents were also asked at the end of each meeting to write down their answer to this question on a sticky note: "How would you cut costs?" After each session, residents were also invited to stay a bit afterward to connect with individual Council members and staff if desired.

A total of 121 people attended the sessions, including 114 unique individuals. (7 residents attended more than one session.) Residents were, in general, older in age than the median demographic age in Red Wing.

MOST COMMON TOPICS RAISED BY RESIDENTS & DISCUSSED IN SESSIONS

- Potential Tax Increase in 2024 Budget
- More Housing for All Ages and Incomes (especially affordable options)
- Concern About City Overspending
- Business Development in Downtown and Old West Main Street areas
- More Opportunities for Teens and Young Adults in Jobs, Entertainment, and Housing
- Speeding (plus additional questions on roads and construction)
- Parking
- Marijuana (mostly legal questions based on the state's new ruling)

The following pages list what residents wrote as their answers to the questions. Tally marks show the number of people who wrote similar ideas. Not every person wrote notes down, and some people wrote multiple things.

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Cut capital projects
Cut staffing III

TOPICS & QUESTIONS

These are topics and questions/comments residents wanted to cover in the session they attended.

- -Overall Budget
 - -Let's focus on what government can do that no one else will or can do
 - -What are we willing to pay now versus paying later (when it will cost more dollars)?
- -Property Taxes
 - -Stop expensive updates the City does that benefit only a small group of people
 - -City needs to stop spending money on extra things for some community members, rather than on necessary services for all community members.
 - -Concern about cost of capital projects like Levee Park and the Old West Main Street project
 - -We should use zero-based budgeting.
 - -Too many tax dollars spent on want-to-be projects and then later ask for more dollars for real needs
- -Personnel (staffing)
 - -What percent of the budget is for salaries, benefits, retirement, and health insurance?
 - -How our City boards and commissions function and their future
 - -How many open positions are there at the City? Is there a hiring freeze for any positions?
- -Capital Improvement Plan
- -City Services
 - -l enjoy the amenities but am willing to do without some
 - -Government needs to pay for the lead pipe removal and cleanup

-Housing

- -Single-family home lots that are buildable for a middle/higher income family
- -Need to incentivize home buying for smaller home
- -Diversity and Inclusion
 - -Inclusion and accessibility
 - -Cultural reconciliation
- -Speeding & Noise
 - -Excessive noise from vehicles on the street (cars, trucks, semis)
- -Parking
 - -Explain parking regulations and required spaces for businesses
- -Crime
 - -Drugs
 - -Car break-ins
 - -People with behavior issues walking in downtown at night
- -Commercial/Retail:
 - -Keep working on real estate with commercial and residential. Coordinate effort with new developers to purchase buildings for mixed-use businesses and rental units for young people and families.

 - -Upper Harbor Area turn the parking area into a winter sledding hill & skating rink for night-time skating run by youth
 - -Want to keep city money in the budget for City internships and communications (like Channel 6 and social media).

Roads & Construction

-Road maintenance schedules because residential streets are in disrepair

- -Need better signage for road construction
- -Cars in left lane passing at a high rate of speed and crossing the solid white line
- -What's happening with the road project on East 7th Street?

-Climate resilience

- -What are our long-range plans and climate?
- -For water conservation, could the City buy rain barrels and sell them to us?

-Garbage costs II

-I've heard Council members saying that the City cannot be competitive in that area unless they overcharge. That's a business the City should not be in.

-Community Development

- -Save the parks and arts
- -Pickleball
- -Incentives for solar installation
- -Long-range plans to improve the community?
- -Council support of police and police staffing. How will Goodhue's police force resignations affect Red Wing?
- -Undocumented residents
- -Al and our future Al budget
- -Systemic racism
- -Historical Preservation increase telling the stories of cultures who lived in Red Wing

- -What is the Council's plans for future spending and/or cuts in spending?
- -Where and when can marijuana be used in and around the city? When will that be decided? Will the public be able to have input into these decisions?
- -Who decides what types of businesses start up in Red Wing?
- -What's going on in the field at the old Central Research Building?
- -Does the City regulate murals on buildings?
- -When was the last time we did RFP's on our third-party vendors?
- -How is City progressing with Air BnB permits?
- -When can the public review CIP items?
- -Have the cost-cutting suggestions from the October 2022 workshop all been implemented yet?
- -Why do we tell people to put their recycling in plastic bags?

- -What is the long-term strategy for the ambulance fund?
- -How can we incentivize home ownership?
- -Do you get many questions from citizens in your area?
- -As our climate changes, how are we developing resilience plans and preparing for climate refugees?
- -Please fix the bike trail along Hwy 61 from A.P. Anderson Park past Burnside School
- -Why do we need all those police cars sitting in front of the jail?
- -Is crime on the increase?
- -What is the status of 3M and their projection to increase employment by 100+ in return for tax benefits?
- -Has anything been done to replace the damaged/vandalized kiosk in Memorial Park?
- -Can we convert some park spaces into prairie to save costs on mowing?

How the Sessions Were Publicized

- --Through City's avenues: City Beat (twice), Channel 6, Facebook multiple times, website
- --Chamber newsletter twice
- --Republican Eagle article
- --Interview on the KWNG radio and additional short reminders on air
- --25 posters distributed throughout the community
- --500 small cards distributed throughout the community

Promotion cards were distributed across a wide range of locations, including the Library, two laundromats, the Hiawatha Bus Transit station, Pier 55, Red Wing Arts, Hanisch Bakery, Mandy's, Randy's, Caribou Coffee, Red Wing Y, Red Wing Arts, Ignite, City Hall, Public Works, Buchanan's, Fair Trade Books, and Pepin Woods. Large signs were placed at each park when the locations were moved to the library due to excessive heat. Large signs were also at each entrance of the library on Wednesday and Thursday.
